

Price is a top tier prospect of the future, and broke the Commodore record for strikeouts this year with 147. This is a record that had not been broken in over 35 years. Alvarez leads the Commodores with 19 home runs which is 4th best in the SEC.

The third seeded Michigan Wolverines are the Big Ten champions. While Michigan has largely been untested this season in the Big Ten, they are coming into this tournament winning 10 out of their last 12 games.

Michigan's team is led by its starting rotation of fifth year senior Paul Hammond, sophomore Chris Fetter and freshman Zach Putnam.

The loss concluded the team's play for the year but two players continued on in other post-season play.

Top-ranked and No. 2 seed Miller as well as Shosho advanced as they competed in the NCAA singles and doubles championship.

In the singles tournament, Miller first beat Pepperdine's Bianca Dulgheru in three sets 6-2, 3-6, 6-3.

Shosho lost her opening match 3-6, 7-6, 6-3 to Kentucky's Kim Coventry.

Miller then advanced to the Round of Sixteen by defeating Duke's Jackie Carleton 6-3, 6-2.

On May 26, Miller defeated the No. 13 seed from Northwestern Cristelle Grier 6-1, 6-1, to advance

yet again as the Jackets ended their season with a 7-2 loss.

Looking toward next season, Tech's softball team will only lose two graduating senior players, outfielder Amy Hosier and shortstop Christine Sheridan.

None of these pitchers has an ERA above three. The Wolverines have connections with the Jackets baseball team. Fifth year senior starting pitcher Drew Taylor was once a student at Tech. As a freshman at Tech, Taylor 11 appearances during the season with a 7.71 ERA in 9.1 innings pitched.

The fourth seeded Stetson Hatters earned a bid to the NCAA tournament by playing their way into via the Atlantic Sun tournament. They were underdogs in their conference, but won the championship to get the automatic bid.

Stetson does have a history of playing the underdog role though. In 2003, the Hatters upset the Jackets 5-4 in their first round match-up of the NCAA Atlanta Regional.

Miller however was stopped short in the tournament by Stanford's Theresa Logar by falling in three sets 6-3, 2-6, 6-3 on May 27.

In the doubles tournament, the duo of Miller/Shosho made it all the way to the Round of Sixteen before being defeated by Northwestern's Cristelle Grier/Alexis Prousis.

Miller and Shosho did however win All-American honors for their doubles play this season. Miller also earned another special recognition for her outstanding singles play this season. She was named the ITA National Player to Watch for 2006.

This leaves many of the key players from this year's team for next season including standout players Whitney Haller and Lacey Richardson.

The Jackets will look to continue the streak of NCAA appearances next season. They will also try to duplicate the ACC title the team earned during the 2004-2005 season.

"I think it is a plus that we have guys on this year's team who were in the same situation in 2003," said Stetson head coach Pete Dunn.

"Even the guys that weren't there understand that it's going to be the same opponent, the same ballpark, and the same environment where we got it done before. I don't want to downplay the abilities of Georgia Tech, it is certainly going to be a challenge, but I don't think it is going to be anything we are overwhelmed with."

The winner of this regional will go on to play the winner of the Lexington Regional. Since Tech is a national seed in the tournament, the Jackets would host the Super Regional of the tournament if they advance past this round.

Crew wins big at the Dad Vail races in Philadelphia

The Tech rowing team left Philadelphia Sunday, May 14 after its most successful showing of the season at the Dad Vail Regatta, the largest collegiate regatta in the nation.

The men's varsity lightweight 8+ placed first with the men's varsity open 4+ placing second.

"Of all our goals this season we've completed nearly every one," said head coach Rob Canavan.

"We gear our entire season toward Dad Vail's, it's what we practice for," said Canavan.

This year's success in the lightweight 8+ marks the first Tech eight to ever win gold at the Dad Vails'.

The triumph came after an amazing season with only one defeat in the event; an early loss to St. Joe's at Knecht Cup which was vindicated as the Yellow Jackets beat the same boat at Vails in a decisive victory.

After a long rain delay, the lightweight 8+ focused on the race at hand and rowed its fastest sprint race of the season. Tech lightweights sped through the entire race and finished 2.6 seconds ahead of St. Joe's.

"It was hands down the best race we had all year," said Theresa Mara, the team's coxswain.

The open 4+'s second place finish came in the last 300 meters of the race with a fast Cal boat just beating Tech.

Nevertheless, the crew is happy with a silver medal.

"We expected more; it wasn't really what I wanted, but somebody has to win silver and we'll take it," said Austin Nichols, a third year Tech rower.

Three of the four will return next year, two of whom will be training in Philadelphia this summer.

Tech crew's varsity women's team has battled intense competition throughout the entire spring season.

The women's varsity pair raced strongly into semifinals where they lost to a strong Saint Thomas crew that went on to win the final event.

Although both the wom-

en's open four+ and lightweight 4+ did not continue out of Dad Vail heats this year, optimistic oarswomen will return next year ready as ever to race again.

"Our squad is on the threshold of becoming a very competitive force in southern rowing and we're all very excited," said Elizabeth York, a second-year rower.

New coaching and a variety of new rowers are on the horizon. These changes look to improve next year's team.

Currently, the team is organizing its upcoming trip to the IRA Regatta scheduled for this June.

Last year Tech attended the national regatta with only one boat.

This year, the team will take two boats: a straight four and pair. Intense training will continue in anticipation of the team's trip to Camden N.J.



Jackets host NCAA regional tourney

The eighth nationally seeded Jackets (45-16) start their run to the College World Series today against the Stetson Hatters (38-22). This is their fifth straight season hosting a regional. It is also their 20th bid in 21 years.

The other potential opponents for the Jackets in the Atlanta Regional are Vanderbilt (36-22) and Michigan (42-19).

Despite the many injuries the Jackets have endured this season, they have been able to play well over the past several weeks.

This past weekend, Tech went 3-2 in the ACC tournament. Tech

defeated the Miami Hurricanes twice and defeated the ACC regular season champion Clemson Tigers once before falling out of the tournament at the hands of those same Tigers after a 16-11 defeat in a doubleheader game.

The Jackets will likely be without the services of Danny Payne and Tim Gustafson for the entire

Atlanta Regional.

Payne has been out since he crashed into Steven Blackwood on April 29 against Boston College. He will in all likelihood not return this season, but there is a chance he might be back if Tech advances.

Gustafson, who was a key member for Tech during last year's NCAA tournament run, might be back if Tech advances to the next round.

Tech's two hottest players going into the NCAA tournament are starting pitcher Blake Wood and first baseman Luke Murton.

In the ACC tournament, Wood threw 8.1 innings, while allowing only one earned run and striking out three.

Murton is four for his last nine at bats, with eight RBI's and three home runs. In game two of the doubleheader against Clemson last Saturday, Murton went 3 for 5 with a seven RBI's and three home runs, including a grand slam in the ninth.

Vanderbilt is the number two seed in the regional, and will most likely be Tech's toughest challenger in this regional. They finished sixth in the SEC standings, but were the runner up to Ole Miss in the SEC Tournament dropping that game 9-3.

The Commodores are led by sophomore starting pitcher David Price and freshman third baseman

Softball finishes 48-22, loses to 'Bama in Regional

The Lady Jackets softball team concluded their season with a final record of 48-22. Tech's softball team finished the regular season fourth in the ACC at 12-9, with an overall record of 43-18.

During the season, Tech played several top 25 opponents.

While the Jackets finished 5-10 for the season against those top 25 opponents, they did split the season series with #10 ranked Georgia in Athens.

From the standpoint of personal performances, no other Tech player stood out as much as freshman Whitney Haller.

For the season, Haller had a .395 batting average, 24 home runs, and 72 RBI's. She also recorded six saves as the Jackets top closer. Haller's home run total was tied for 2nd overall in the NCAA.

The best Tech player from the circle this season was junior Sarah Wood. For the season, she had an ERA of 2.78, while striking out 98, and only walking 38.

Going into ACC tournament, the Jackets were the fourth seed. After falling in their first game to the Florida State Seminoles, Tech battled back through the loser's bracket by defeating Boston College and Virginia the next

day to give themselves a chance to advance to the championship game.

In order to accomplish that feat, they would have had to defeat the Seminoles twice in a row.

While Tech was able to defeat Florida State in game one, lightning did not strike twice for the Jackets as they fell 7-4.

The Jackets did however qualify for the NCAA tournament for the third consecutive season.

In the Alabama regional, the softball team went 2-2. They lost twice to host Alabama, while defeating the three seed Florida A&M twice.

In game one, the Jackets came from behind after being down 3-0 to win 9-3 against the Rattlers.

Against Alabama the next day, Tech's ninth inning rally fell short in their 8-5 defeat.

The Jackets stayed alive the next day by winning a 10-7 slugfest to eliminate the Rattlers from the tournament and advance to the championship game against Alabama, where they would have to win twice to advance to the Super Regionals.

The Crimson Tide proved to be more than Tech could handle

Tennis wins back-to-back ACC titles

The women's tennis team finished their season 23-6 as they won their second consecutive ACC title and advanced to the NCAA Round of Sixteen.

This marked the first ACC championship for any Tech team in 2006.

The Jackets earned a No. 1 seed in the ACC tournament by going 9-2 in ACC play this season.

Tech got to the ACC championship game by easily defeating N.C. State 4-0, and Clemson 4-1.

In the championship match on April 23, Tech faced No. 9 Miami.

Kelly Anderson, Kristi Miller and Christy Striplin all won their singles matches to help propel Tech over Miami, 4-1.

The top player in the nation, Kristi Miller, was named the tournament MVP.

This marks the first time in history that Tech has won back-to-back ACC championships.

After the ACC tournament Tech earned a No. 6 seeding and hosted the NCAA Atlanta Regional at the Bill Moore Tennis Center.

In the first round the Jackets cruised past Southeastern Louisiana 4-0. In that match Whitney McCray/Kelly Anderson garnered the doubles point with Anderson, Miller, and Striplin claiming singles wins.

Tech's next opponent was Penn

which had claimed a victory over the Tennessee Volunteers in the opening round.

The match against Penn seemed very similar to Tech's win over Southeastern Louisiana as Tech blanked the Quakers 4-0.

Miller, Lyndsay Shosho, and Alison Silverio won their singles matches, with the top doubles team of Miller/Shosho winning their doubles point to claim the fourth point of the match.

With the win the Jackets advanced to the NCAA championships hosted by Stanford University on

May 18.

Tech faced the 11th seeded and No. 9 Wildcats of Northwestern University.

The Wildcats upset the Jackets 4-0, halting the Jacket's season.

Miller/Shosho and Anderson/McCray lost both their doubles matches 8-4 to allow Northwestern to claim the doubles points.

In the singles competition, Shosho, Alison Silverio and Taryn Rudman all lost their matches to allow Northwestern to claim the victory.
