# Defeat

Jackets lose seventh consecutive game to UGA, 31-17

Tech lost its seventh consecutive game to rival Georgia last Saturday, 31-17.

Running back Tashard Choice led the offense, carrying the ball 25 times for 134 yards. He was one of 15 seniors playing on Senior Day, the last home game for the Jackets. It was his eighth 100-yard game of the season and the eighteenth of his career.

Despite the strong rushing performance, the team continued to have troubles in the passing game. On Tech's second offensive play, quarterback Taylor Bennett threw a deep pass straight into the hands of wide receiver Correy Earls, who bobbled

the pass and then dropped it.

"When you don't get a couple of them, does it hurt your team? Sure it does. You think you've got a big play and then all of a sudden you don't...Everybody is excited, but all of a sudden you're down. It takes its toll," said former Head Coach Chan Gailey.

Bennett did not have a good day, finishing 9-for-27 for 137 yards, one touchdown and one interception. He did not start at the beginning of the second half because he was injured on the second to last play of the first half. After the game, he was taken in for x-rays on his hand.

"I thought he did some good things early. When he got banged up he fought through it in the second half," Gailey said.

The game was defined by the opportunities on which Tech failed to capitalize on. On two kick returns, a UGA player fumbled the ball into the end zone. On both plays, they recovered for a touchback.

On another play, Morgan Burnett picked up a botched backwards pass from Georgia quarterback Matthew Stafford and ran with it towards the endzone. As he was rushing towards a sure touchdown, he was tackled and fumbled the ball into the endzone, leaving the ball up for grabs again. The ball was eventually kicked out of bounds and declared a touchback.

"I saw that the guy missed the pass and that it was a live ball, scooped it up and ran with it. I started to lose my footing, and should have done

a better job of just holding onto the ball. That's my fault for not holding on to the ball," Burnett said.

Although the defense had constant pressure on Matthew Stafford, they produced only one sack. They limited star running back Knowshon Moreno to only 45 yards on 17 carries, but allowed several large rushing plays. During Georgia's first offensive drive of the second half, Stafford faked a handoff and ran straight up the middle for a 31-yard touchdown.

"I felt so slow on that. I was running, and I guess I had a decent fake and everybody took off with everybody else, so there was nobody there. It felt like it took me

# Basketball teams play on the road

Eric Gordon continued the great start to his college career when the Jackets visited Assembly Hall at Indiana University on Tuesday night for the 2007 Big Ten/ACC Challenge. The game was characterized by highs and lows for both teams. Tech got off to a flying start and then lulled the last 10 minutes of the first half and repeated the trends in the second half. The Jackets built a 26-18 lead in the first half before stalling and losing 83-79. Indiana attempted 38 free throws to the Jackets' 20.

Last week, the team took home third place at the Paradise Jam tournament thanks in part to Matt

Causey's last second shot against Notre Dame. The early season has been very inconsistent for the Jackets who have yet to win three straight games this season. The Jackets looked very inconsistent during the tournament and were not able to play solid defense until the last 10 minutes of every game.

Winthrop posed a much greater threat for the Jackets the following night. In Tech's second tournament game, they looked more like the team that lost to Greensboro at home than the team in either of their wins. The second half, however, was a different story. The Jackets increased their lead to 10 points in the second half before Winthrop went on a 12-0

# Cross country team races past the competition

The cross country team has just capped off an exciting season. This year, senior David Herren, who recently finished 11th at the regional meet, will represent Tech at the NCAA Championships.

"Last Saturday, I qualified for the National [tourney], which was not necessarily expected but was certainly welcomed. I just happened to have a really good day on the right day and went along with the guys pulling me through workouts. It was just a great way for me to end my cross country career here, and it lets me say goodbye to the sport in a good way," Herren said.

Herren, a former all-ACC Academic member, finished first for the Jackets at the ACC Championships'

8K in a time of 23:35. Senior Cristan Duvall was second for the Jackets at both of these meets.

"It wasn't really just me. There were a lot of times during workouts that I wouldn't had finished if it had not been for some of the guys stepping up, including [Duvall] and [Emory Clarence] Gibbs during the repeats. It was more of a collaborative effort with those guys rather than just a solo thing...I think one of the biggest guys to step up this year was Matt Hickey...[who is] one of the hardest workers on the team, if not the hardest worker on the team," Herren said.

Senior Elena Linn also led the women's team at the ACC tournament and the regional meet. She recently earned All-South Region Honors for her outing at her last cross country meet of her collegiate

career.

"Everybody pretty much [earned their personal record time] and we just had some bad meets and some bad times, like at ACC [tournament], but overall we really showed the kind of strength that we're capable of," Linn said.

Earlier this fall, the Jackets ran past the competition in long strides at the UTC Invitational. At this event, the Jackets finished first amongst the women's teams, with seven members in the top 25.

The Tech teams performed well at the Vanderbilt Classic. At this event, Herren, Iain Turnbull and Duvall were the first three Jackets to cross the finish line.

They finished with times less than 27 minutes. The women's side, led

# Volleyball ends season with two-game road trip

The Jackets finished off an excellent season with 16 conference wins and an ACC third-place finish. Despite their great efforts, the three seniors from the last Tech team to reach the NCAA tourney could not carry this year's team into the national spotlight.

The team lost its final game of the year to Maryland, downing the last remaining chances of Tech being eligible to play in the national tournament. Having been predicted to finish second in the ACC, the Jackets focused on their key rival Duke but were caught by surprise by the rising stars of Clemson.

The Jackets were on a strong surge in the second half of the

season, winning nine of the last 11 matches. They also defeated every single opponent at home during the remaining half.

"I'm so proud of how our passers and our defenders have been doing this year. Michelle Kendall, our libero, broke a record this year in digs; Jordan McCullers and Lindsey Gray have been playing phenomenally; our offense, this year, is doing extremely well," said Allie Niekamp, a power setter.

For instance, the Jackets recently downed the Miami Hurricanes; Nikki Kaminskas followed through with one of her best outings with a total of 15 kills and a .700 hitting average for the night.

"For every single program, we have a scouting plan, and I think [Friday night] we did a really good

job at executing that scouting plan," Niekamp said.

For Senior Night, against Florida State, the Jackets played well to a large crowd. Lindsey Gray, also a fourth-year member of the team, provided key leadership and managed six digs for the night.

Overall, the Jackets won about 75% of their home matches this season. This has reinforced the opinion that O'Keefe Gymnasium is one of the toughest facilities for opponents.

"I would say [that crowd is the thing I would miss most]. Come game night, on Fridays and Saturdays, O'Keefe is definitely the hardest place to play in for any visiting team. Going on the road, you definitely

# Students react to Gailey's dismissal

When Chan Gailey arrived on campus during the 2002 off-season, he had the campus talking about future prospects.

Students were hopeful that the former NFL coach that led the Cowboys to the playoffs in consecutive seasons could bring that kind of success to the Tech program.

Gailey went into his first season with uncertain expectations and looked to be heading in the right direction. His first campaign included a win against No. 10 and undefeated North Carolina State, but also saw the Jackets lose to UGA in the most lopsided loss for Tech in series history, 51-7.

The following season saw no progress as Tech managed an opening game loss at BYU before coming home to upset Auburn at Bobby Dodd. Gailey led Tech to another 4-4 season in the conference, but one of those losses came to a Duke team that had not won an ACC game since 1999. Under Gailey, Tech had win streaks greater than three games only twice, and both

were in the year Tech went to the ACC Championship Game.

Despite Gailey being the only coach in Tech history never to have a losing season, he was never truly embraced by the fans, alumni and student-fan bases,

"I'm glad that Gailey is gone. While he may have kept us an above-.500 team, he never seemed to have a winning attitude, especially against [Georgia]. I hope that

we're able to bring a real winning spirit to the football team with a new coach," said Scott Travis, a fourth-year Electrical and Computer Engineering major.

Perhaps fans would have been able to forgive Gailey had he been able to beat the school's most hated rival. Tech went 3-3 under Gailey against conference rival Clemson, but 0-6 against the Bulldogs.

"Not beating Georgia for 6 straight years just doesn't cut it," said Joe Vandergrift, a fourth-year

Mechanical Engineering major.

Other students also had various opinions about the decision.

"He just didn't seem to have the likeable personality needed to really raise excitement about the GT team and really take them to the next level. So, in the long run, it was probably a good decision," said Stephanie Walker, a graduate student.

Gailey's inability to interact with the public is something that will be addressed in the new coaching search. Tech Athletic Director Dan Radakovich is making an effort to find a coach that will be open with

fans and can bring excitement to the Tech community.

"Any other coach with a Calvin Johnson and a Tashard Choice on their team should have gone to national championships or a BCS bowl. Also, with seven all-ACC players on our team, most in the ACC this year, a 7-5 team is mediocre at best," said Geoff Greenhill, a fourth-year Management major.

Jon Tenuta has been named interim head coach and will coach during the bowl game. He is also being considered for the permanent job.

With the Jackets holding a slight lead in the fourth game, third-year Stephanie Robbins stepped up in place of the senior blocker and tallied two crucial service aces to help extend the match into a tiebreaker game. However, the Terrapins managed six unanswered points to take away the win.

The Jackets have much to be thankful for this season. Stellar players Ulrike Stegemann and Talisa Kellogg were named to the All-ACC teams. The Jackets will retain much of their power with Kellogg next season, when the Jackets try and get back to the NCAA tournament.

# Hockey defeats UGA, 5-0

At 2-11, Tech men's hockey team was unlikely candidate to pull up an upset victory against undefeated UGA last week in a rivalry game, but was able to easily win the game, 5-0.

Tech played shorthanded but did not let that play a factor when they took on the Ice Dogs last week. Sound defense and timely scoring allowed the team to score their third win of the season in dominating fashion.

The Jackets did a good job of keeping Georgia off balance and that kept the Dawgs from setting up a clean shot on the offensive end. This combined with Tech's sudden offensive explosion allowed the unlikely rout to happen.

The Jackets started the scoring quickly. 53 seconds into the game, second-year forward Andy DeCherico scored. He was assisted by for-

ward Dale Sharpe and defenseman David Means. Four minutes later Whitney Yiu scored with assists from forward Tom Porter and defenseman

B.J. Stapleton. Stapleton also took it upon himself to make his own scoring opportunities.

Stapleton took advantage of two separate power play opportunities in the first period to score twice; the second score put the Jackets up 4-0. The senior was also a force on defense.

He finished with two goals and one assist, making something happen on both ends of the rink.

The Jackets added another goal in the second period on an end-to-end unassisted shorthand goal by Yiu. Goalie Maxx Lucas turned away shot after shot to secure his first shutout of the season.

After building a large lead, Tech played strong defense in the second half to preserve the shut out and the win. Lucas stopped 35 shots.

Tech had come into the game allowing upwards of 50 shots per game. Tech scored its five goals on 36 shots, though they did not score a goal in the third period.

The Jackets will get another two chances to defeat the Ice Dogs come January, when the teams play twice in a span of a week, on Jan. 19 and 26.

Their next game comes against Middle Tennessee today in Alpharetta at 9:45p.m.

while the Jackets got off just three shots in that time.

The third place game pitted Tech against Notre Dame. Tech played their most complete game of the season against the Irish to that point. Notre Dame held a lead after the 17 minute mark in the first half and took that lead all the way to half time, but was unable to sustain it as Tech won 70-69. The Jackets travel to Vanderbilt this Saturday to try to pad their NCAA tournament resume on the road at 1 p.m.

Tech's Women's Basketball team continued its winning ways going to 5-0. The Jackets picked up wins against Temple, a tournament team from last year, Northwestern and an Iowa team that was 4-1 coming into

their match up against Tech.

In the game against Temple, Tech's impressive 17 point scoring drive led by senior guard Chioma

Nnamaka helped Tech take a four point lead into the half. In the second half Tech's strong perimeter defense held the Owls to only two of 12 at-

tempted three point shots. Guard Janie Mitchell led the team with 20 points in their 59-49 win.

In the Jackets next game against Northwestern, the 22 points by Nnamaka and nine rebounds each by Mitchell and freshman forward Alex Montgomery clinched the 55-46 win.

In Tech's ACC/Big Ten Challenge match up against Iowa, the Jackets only trailed for a total of 19 seconds in the first half, but went into the locker-room with only a three point lead.

Tech was able to improve on their first half to beat Iowa 76-57 for their second road win. The Jackets next play at Athens when they play No. 8 Georgia. A win against Georgia would most likely propel Tech into the top 25.

a month to get into the end zone," Stafford said.

Georgia running back Thomas Brown rushed for 139 yards on 17 carries and one touchdown. He was the first back since Virginia's Cedric Peerman to rush for over 100 yards.

"We focused on Moreno, and they snuck in Brown. He got a lot of yards," said Tech middle linebacker Philip Wheeler.

Tech was able to answer that touchdown with a drive that saw Bennett throw his seventh touchdown of the season and had the Jackets taking a 14-10 lead. Georgia came back to score a touchdown on a 51 second drive. The drive was sustained when a pass interference penalty was called on Burnett.

"I felt that it was a good play on my part. The referee didn't give me an explanation as to what I did....After the call, though, I just had to get it

back together and play the next down and move on," Burnett said.

Stafford completed a 9-yard pass to wide receiver Mohammed Mas-saquoi for the touchdown. After a

rare missed PAT by Georgia kicker Brandon Coutu, the two teams headed into the locker room with Georgia leading 16-14. The first half saw four lead changes, but Tech was unable to catch up in the second.

Though the game was in reach

for most of the second half, the game was all but over when Brown ran the ball 32-yards for a touchdown and Georgia converted a two point conversion to give the team a 31-17 lead. On the next drive, Bennett was unable to get the ball to receiver Greg Smith on fourth-and-eight at the Georgia 20, effectively ending all hope of a comeback.

Tech falls to 38-59-5 in the series and has matched its longest losing streak at seven.

"Whenever you are playing a good team, and Georgia is always a good team, they always have talent on both sides of the ball. And, when you don't capitalize in certain situations, you will lose the game every time," Choice said.

The team now enters an uncertain period of waiting for a bowl selection. Many have indicated that it is likely Tech will go to one of three bowls: the Emerald Bowl in San Francisco, the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl in Nashville or the Humanitarian Bowl in Boise.
