Tech dropped the doubles point for the first time in the tournament with Vanja Corovic and Marija Milic beating Miller and Krupina, 8-2. Flower and Christy Striplin defeated Mello and Courtney Zauft, 8-6. Hickey and McCray fell short 8-6 to Stephanie Davison and Caroline Larsson.

Sarah Lancaster stopped Hickey in the second set to win 6-1, 6-3.

Down 2-0, the Jackets rallied when Striplin earned a 6-3, 6-2 win over Larsson. Miller won the No. 1 singles point with a 6-3, 6-4 victory over Corovic. The points kept coming for the Jackets as Amanda McDowell beat Zauft, 6-2, 6-4 before Flower clinched the match for Tech with her win over Mello in No. 5 singles.

# Women's tennis falls in Elite Eight to Florida

Having won the last three nation titles, the Jackets women's tennis team had high hopes for this year's tournament. However, they ran into a Florida team that had lost just two matches all year.

The Jackets fought, but came up short in the doubles that set the tone for the day. Tech's Kristi Miller and Sasha Krupina won the first match 8-4 over Megan Alexander and Marrit Boonstra.

Tech was unable to capitalize though as Kirsten Flower and Christy Striplin lost their match 5-8 to Julia Cohen and Anastasia Revzina. Noelle Hickey and Whitney McCray fell to Whitney Benik and Csilla Borsanyi, 8-6, giving the Gators the doubles point.

Singles went back and forth between the two teams. Benik was the first to finish for the Gators, she dropped the first two games to Striplin but won 12 straight to take

the match, 6-2, 6-0.

Tech secured the next point at No. 2 singles when Amanda McDowell cruised to a 6-2, 6-0 victory over Borsanyi. Florida took their third point at the No. 5 spot; Boonstra defeated Flower, 6-3, 6-4. Tech rebounded with their second point; Miller dropped Cohen, 6-2, 6-3.

Florida clinched the match in the No. 6 spot. Hickey won the first set 6-4, but Revzina rebounded to take the next two sets 1-6, 1-6 and put Florida into the Final Four. This was the last tournament for seniors Miller and McCray.

The Jackets started their de-

fense of the 2007 women's tennis title with a sweep when they beat Alcorn State 4-0 in the first round in Atlanta.

"The first match of every tournament is always a little bit tough. The girls handled it well today, I thought they came out here and competed hard," said head coach Bryan Shelton after the match.

Tech, hosting a regional that included Illinois and Tennessee,

swept the doubles matches and won all three singles matches 6-0, 6-0 with Hickey, McCray and Striplin picking up points.

"They are really excited about this tournament. Last year we had so much to be thankful for and things just went our way. We wanted to get off to a good start and we were able to do that today," Shelton said.

The Jackets followed with a

second round sweep over No. 25 Tennessee.

"Tennessee's a very good team, they pushed us to the limit in the doubles but we were able to respond being down 6-1 in the No. 2 doubles... In the singles play, I thought we did a really good job of just competing and staying composed out there on the court. I think the composure pulled us through in the end," Shelton said

after Saturday's match.

The Jackets opened the doubles round with an 8-5 win when Flower and Striplin beat Jennifer Meredith and Connor Vogel. No. 16 Caitlin Whoriskey and Zsafia Zubor subsequently beat Miller and Krupina, 8-6. Tennessee looked like it would finish off the Jackets in the No. 2

## Baseball finishes season with win

The Jackets ended the regular season with against Virginia in a battle for the No. 5 seed in the ACC tournament. Tech swung the bats well throughout the series, including Tony Plagman, who had eight hits during the series.

In the first game, the Jackets fell short as they were limited to just six hits. Luke Murton scored both of the team's runs. The starting pitcher David Duncan gave up just one earned run but took the loss.

In the second game, Plagman led the offense by driving in four runs. Murton went three for four with three RBI and score two runs. Pitcher Eddie Burns set a school record for most hit batters in a career.

The Jackets scored three in the third inning and added four more runs in the sixth with RBI hits from Dietrich, Feltes, Jason Haniger and Chris House. The Jackets hammered out a grand total of 19 hits.

Finally, Plagman pounded out five hits and Feltes added two hits and three RBI in Tech's 9-7 regular season finale victory.

Zach Von Tersch fanned two batters and gave up just three runs in six innings, with Chris Hicks picking up the save.

The Jackets' damage mostly came in the fourth when they scored four times. Charlie Blackmon initiated the rally with a single and scored on a double by Dietrich. Plagman and Feltes also scored in runners on solid hits. In the seventh, Nichols' pinch

hit RBI-single gave the Jackets some insurance.

The Jackets faced UGA for the second game in their series. The Jackets put up a superior defense to only allow the opponent to score one run. McGuire collected nine strike-outs and only allowed four hits against the ranked opponent.

Luke Murton hit a solo home run for Tech. By the sixth inning,

the Jackets pushed the score to 7-1 with a RBI double by Murton. Blackmon and Feltes each added two run home runs.

Earlier this season, Clemson traveled to Atlanta to face the Jackets in Tech's final home series. The Jackets won two of the three games thanks to strong pitching.

David Duncan pitched eight innings in the first game allowing just one run. Andrew Robinson pitched a perfect ninth inning to pick up the save.

The Jackets put up three runs early in the game. Jason Haniger grounded

in a runner. In addition, Charlie Blackmon and Jeff Rowland each had RBI singles. Thomas Nichols' RBI single brought in the fifth run for the Jackets.

Once again, the Tech pitching staff dominated the Clemson Tigers in the second game. Eddie Burns gave up just one run in the eighth after pitching seven scoreless innings.

Luke Murton and Jeff Rowland each contributed two RBI in the game. Rowland's third inning single scored the first run of the game. The Jackets added four runs in the fourth capped off by a Nichols double.

The Jackets could not complete the sweep as Clemson scored 16 times off 20 hits in the rubber game. Tech could only put together six runs of their own in the final game.

Finally, the third game against UGA in their annual split series was a pitchers duel at Turner Field with over 22,000 fans in attendance.

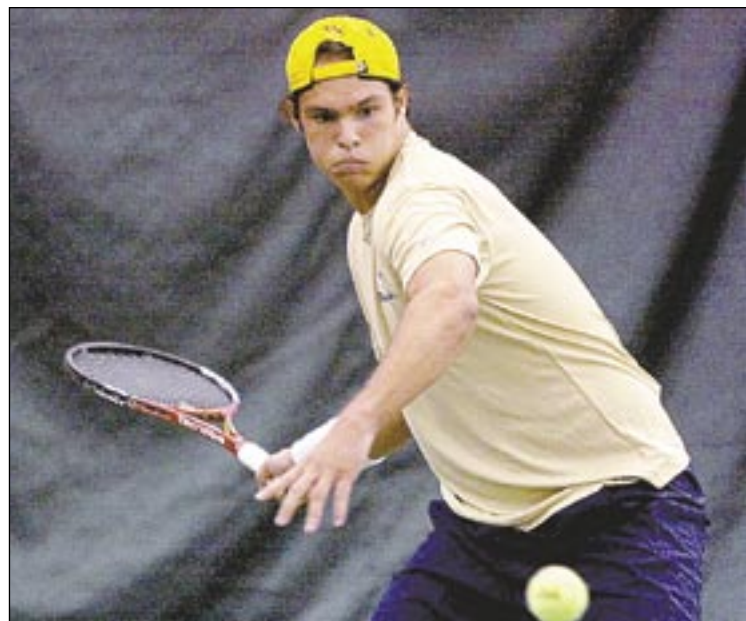

## Mens tennis suffers losses in NCAA, ACC tournaments

Guillermo Gomez, the only Tech men's player selected for the NCAA tournament, lost in the first round on Wednesday capping a successful freshman year. Gomez, named the 2008 ACC Rookie of the year and ITA Mid-East Region Rookie of the Year, lost to Bassam Beidas of Pepperdine, 3-6, 6-7 (5-7). Gomez became the first Tech men's player to win the conference rookie of the year award since Roger Anderson in 2000. Gomez also became the

first Tech player to win the ITA regional award since Paul Stevens was named it in 1991. Gomez is the first Tech rookie to participate in the NCAA tournament since women's coach Bryan Shelton represented the Jackets in 1985. Gomez was also named to the All-ACC men's tennis team for the season, becoming the only Tech player to do so.

The men's team season ended with a close loss to No. 8 seed North Carolina State in the ACC Tournament at Sanlando Park,
