This should allow for easier migration to other systems if necessary in the future. This will include the input and revision of over 50,000 records.

From the Director's desk...

As of August this year, GIL became our official catalog for access to our physical and some virtual collections. While we are temporarily retaining GTEC under the BRS search engine, it is not being regularly updated. In fact, holdings and similar information is being removed as that content is updated in GIL. The new content will assist library staff, students, faculty, and others in determining journal/serial locations; e.g. that a journal may have 4 locations — electronic journal (internet), storage, general collection, and on 1 East "current shelves." GIL also includes bindery and "current issues" receipt information. Although the interface and capabilities of GIL sometimes require changes in the way we operate, in the long term it is essential that we migrate. In fact, we have been informed by the Board of Regents that we must make this change. They even require that our catalog be exactly the same as all the other state institutions in its look and feel. You will recognize the advantages that this presents to students who find it necessary to use libraries other than the one at their home institution. And, of course, you can see the advantage to the State of Georgia as it attempts to promote its economic development outside the State.

Similarly, we are making changes in GTEL and our web pages. The library contracted with MacQuarium to re-design our entire web presence. You are likely aware that the campus pages have been greatly improved by the work MacQuarium did under a contract with the Institute Public Affairs Office. As a result of our work with MacQuarium, Heather and a team including Yen, Donna and Tim are revising our entire site. It is a major undertaking involving over 5,000 static pages that won't be completed until next summer. When it is ready, the opportunities for you to contribute content directly through templates will make maintenance easier for you. In the meantime, it is important that we hold changes to our current web pages to a minimum. Therefore, please do not ask for changes unless they are essential. I have authorized the web team to forego changes you request if the longer-term project will eventually accommodate them anyway.

You should also be aware that GTEL is changing as well. For many years, the library "loaded its own." That was a pioneering effort when it was initiated and has been a powerful way to provide access for

Turkey Day Trivia



-- The Pilgrims who sailed on the Mayflower were members of the English Separatist Church (a Puritan sect). Seeking a better life, they negotiated with a London stock company to finance the voyage to America. Most of those aboard the Mayflower were hired to protect the company's interests. Only about one-third of the original colonists were Puritans.

-- The Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock on December 11, 1620. By fall, they had lost 46 of the 102 people who sailed on the Mayflower. In 1621, the remaining colonists decided to have a feast to celebrate their first harvest. The celebration included 91 Indians who had helped the Pilgrims survive. The Pilgrims would not have lived through the year without their help.

-- The feast was a traditional English harvest festival that lasted three days. Governor William Bradford sent "four men fowling" after wild ducks and geese. We don't know if they ate turkey since "turkey" meant any kind of fowl. We do know they didn't eat pumpkin pie. They ate boiled pumpkin and made fried bread from corn. There was also no milk, cider, potatoes, or butter. There were no cattle for dairy products, and the newly discovered potato was thought to be poisonous. The rest of the menu was made up of fish, berries, watercress, lobster, dried fruit, clams, venison, and plums.

-- On June 20, 1676, the council of Charlestown, Mass, proclaimed June 29 the day for thanksgiving. In 1863, President Lincoln changed it to the last Thursday in November. And in 1941, Thanksgiving was made a legal holiday observed on the fourth Thursday in November.

our users to timely research information. However, with the emergence of live URL's in the indexes of licensed products and related technology changes as well as cross searching with Galileo, we are gradually shifting away from local loading. More importantly, Galileo is considering a consortia purchase of SFX or similar software to facilitate connectivity between scholarly citations. If Galileo isn't able to make this purchase, we will endeavor to find a way to add this improvement ourselves. It is important that we simplify the process of accessing the growing collection of scholarly content in the digital world.

All of these initiatives are inter-related and very important to improving our services. They require us to make some changes, but they are for the better. I hope you understand and will continue to be supportive. If you find yourself wondering why something has happened to an information tool or system you use a lot. Ask your supervisor or me to explain. Thanks. (- Rich)
