McElroy appointed Associate AD

Georgia continued the trend of two-out scoring in the seventh, adding five runs to bring the score to the final of 3-5. Tony Burchett drove in two runs on a bloop double that curved down the right field line. After Tech intentionally walked Keppinger, Doc Brooks punished the move by blasting a three-run homer, his 16th of the year.

The Bulldogs went on to win the regional, and will face Florida State in the super regional in Athens this weekend. The winner of that series will advance to Omaha, Nebraska to compete in the College World Series.

Tech concludes its season at 41-20. Although they were eliminated from the tournament, in the first round this season marks the 16th time in the past 17 seasons that Tech has been invited to the NCAA Tournament.

Golf team gears up for NCAA Tournament

After clearing the field at the ACC Tournament, Molder and company try to bring home the national title. The Jackets enter the tournament a number nineteen seed, despite being ranked number two in the nation.

As this year's sports season comes to a close, the Georgia Tech golf team is about to begin the NCAA Championship. Tech's golf team has finished another strong year, and now has the opportunity to bring home the national title. Coming into this weekend's NCAA Championship at Duke, the Yellow Jackets are ranked number two in the nation behind UGA.

In order to claim a spot in the championship lineup, the Tech team first had to qualify in the East Regional in Williamsburg, Virginia, which took place from May 17th-19th. Tech finished with an 18-under 846 in the 54-hole event at the Golden Horseshoe Golf Course. The score was good enough to place them seventh among the ten teams that would advance to the championship. East Tennessee State, NC State, and University of Florida rounded out the top three places with respective scores of 828, 836, and 837. Tech's score was bolstered by Bryce Molder who finished second in the individual standings with a 13-under-par 68-69-66-203, climbing the ranks on the final day with a 6-under-par 66. He was helped by Junior Matt Weibring who recorded a 6-under-par 69-70-71-210 and placed tenth. Due to the sev-

enth-place finish, the second ranked Jackets will be seeded 19th in this weekend's final.

The East Regionals were preceded by the ACC Championship, which took place three weeks earlier. This year's ACC Championship was held at Disney's Magnolia Golf Course in Orlando. Through the

first two days of play, Tech could not surpass Wake Forest. On the final day however, Tech not only caught up with but also acquired a convincing lead and finished with a three day 19-under-par. Again Molder finished second, this time with an 11-under 205, two shots behind Clemson's Jon Engler. This marks

the sixth time within the last ten years, and the seventh time ever, that Tech has won the ACC Championship.

Tech's golf team has definitely received their share of awards this year. The lion's share of these have been given to the No. 1 player in the nation Bryce Molder. He has

been named for the third time to the Palmer Cup American Team and received the Dave Williams award, given to the best player in the nation. Also, for the third time he was named the ACC Player of the Year and for the fourth time to the All-ACC team. This is a feat that has been accomplished by fellow Tech greats David Duval and Matt Kuchar, both of whom are currently on the PGA Tour. Molder's accomplishments have been well earned, as his career stroke average of 70.69 and this season's average of 69.23 not only set Tech records, but are also the lowest in NCAA history.

Joining Molder on the All-ACC team is sophomore Troy Matteson. Matteson has come through strong in most of Tech's statistical categories. His peak performance was a No. 2 finish in the Las Vegas Intercollegiate that secured the win for that event.

Coach Bruce Heppler also became the third Tech coach this year to earn ACC Coach of the Year. This is the second time in the last three years that Heppler has earned this acknowledgement.

At press time, Tech was in second place at 1-over-par with a 289 behind the University of Arizona at 8-under-par with a 280. Sophomore Kris Mikkelsen is currently leading the Jackets with a 6-under-par 66.

Georgia eliminates Tech from NCAA Baseball Tournament

The baseball season finally ended last Saturday, when the Jackets finished the season on a four game slide to end their chances for the NCAA Championship. They lost the first of those two games in the ACC Tourney in Fort Mill, SC. Tech started the tournament with a number 4 seed, and was in position for another ACC Championship by beating Duke in their first game, and Florida State (seeded #1) in the second with an extra-inning thriller.

Tech's luck would then shift to Wake Forest, as the Deacons relied on strong hitting and fielding to limit the Jackets to 3 runs, knocking Tech into the loser's bracket and elevating Wake to the driver's seat. Tech's next game came on Saturday morning, where they faced NC State, whose only chance to make the field of 64 was by winning the conference's automatic bid.

With the Jackets leading 4-3 and with two State outs in the eighth inning, David Hicks reached first base on a questionable call. A home run followed the play, giving State the lead and eventually the win. Head Coach Danny Hall had this to say about the bang-bang play at first, where pitcher Brian Burks tripped over the bag well before Hicks crossed it, "I'm not allowed to comment on the call. My pitcher told me he stepped on it. I thought he

Following the ACC, in the NCAA Regional Tournament, Georgia Tech was defeated by arch-rival Georgia in the loser's bracket last Saturday at Foley Field. Tech met the Bulldogs after dropping their first game to Coastal Carolina 5-3 and a Georgia loss to Georgia Southern.

In their game with the Jackets Adam Swann lead Georgia to victory, going 5-for-5 at the plate with a grand slam and five RBI's.

Rob Moravek (3-4) earned the win, while Jody Friedman picked up his second save of the season. Moravek gave up five runs on 10 hits in 6.2 innings, while Friedman allowed one hit and no runs over the final 2.1 innings. Tech starter

Steve Kelly (7-5) was the losing pitcher. Kelly pitched 5.2 innings, and gave up eight earned runs.


Both teams pecked at the score through the early innings, going into the sixth inning with a 3-1 Georgia lead.

Tech then added another run, bringing the score to 3-2. Jason Basil and Brian Prince both singled to reach base. Basil then took advantage of a Moravek wild pitch to reach third, and was able to score on a passed ball.

The Bulldogs came to life in the bottom of the sixth, scoring five runs to boost the score to 8-2. All five runs came after two outs with the bases empty. Kelly walked Neufeld on four pitches to start the rally, and then gave up a right field single to Coffee. Neufeld then scored on Jeff Keppinger's infield single. After Doc Brooks walked to load the bases, Swann sailed a 1-2 pitch over the left-center field wall. It was Swann's sixth home run of the season.

Tech's biggest rally came in the top of the seventh, when they scored three runs after two outs to cut the lead to 8-5. After the first two batters were retired, six Tech batters reached base safely. Lewis started the scoring by bringing Boggs home on an RBI single. Mark Teixeira nearly blew the game open at this point with an RBI double, ripping a fastball from the low-outside cor-
